1st. That the course on which the cable has been laid, from a short distance outwards from the leading marks for several miles seaward, is a wide deviation from the course indicated by the surveyed 2nd. That the cable has been laid in dangerous proximity to the refuge anchorage of Sea Elephant

Bay. 3rd. That the cable was laid down without the stipulated inspection and supervision necessary for the satisfaction of the Government.
