REPORT.

Although the business of the Department has increased considerably during the past year, the Revenue Returns are not so satisfactory as those for 1869.

The gross amounts collected in 1870 were—Postage and Money Order Commission, £126,596; Telegraphic Messages, £33,145.

This shows a falling off from the receipts for 1869 on postage, &c., of £624 and on telegraphic messages of £1038, which is to be accounted for by the reduction that has taken place as hereinafter mentioned in the rates of postage on intercolonial ship letters and on telegraphic messages; and, to some extent, by the operation of the Stamp Statute, which has greatly decreased the facilities afforded to the public for the purchase of postage stamps by diminishing the number of licensed vendors. It should also be noticed in connection with the Stamp Statute, as affecting the revenue for 1870, that from the date it came into force (1st January 1870), the commission allowed to licensed vendors was reduced from 5 per cent. to 2½ per cent. Very large purchases were made in the last few days of December 1869, amounting, at least, to £1500 more than would otherwise have been the case; and, consequently, the sum named was credited in the accounts of 1869 instead of appearing as part of the receipts of 1870, to which it fairly belonged.

But for these circumstances the revenue of the Post Office for 1870 would have shown an excess over the collections for 1869 equal to that of 1868 over 1867, or, say (£5000) five thousand pounds.

The rates on ship letters to New Zealand, New South Wales, South Australia, and Tasmania, were reduced from sixpence to threepence per half-ounce on the 27th May, 1st July, 1st August, and 1st November respectively.

The rates on local telegraphic messages were reduced to the uniform charge of one shilling for ten words on the 1st January 1870, and on intercolonial messages on the following dates, viz.:—South Australia, 1st August; New South Wales and Queensland, 8th August.

The charges on intercolonial messages were fixed at a minimum of 2s. with South Australia, 3s. with New South Wales, except to Albury and Deniliquin, to which places the charge was made 2s., and 6s. with Queensland; this Department receiving on a message to South Australia one-half, on a message to New South Wales, at 2s. rate one-half, and at 3s. rate one-third; and on a message to Queensland one-third.

The extraordinary increase in the number of telegrams in the early part of 1870, gave promise of a business that would not only prevent any falling off in revenue but would compensate for the additional outlay occasioned by the appointment of junior operators and messengers, which the largely increased transactions that immediately followed the reduction in rates made necessary.

The failure of these expectations is, no doubt, due to the depression in business generally throughout the colony during the latter part of the past year, but more particularly to the extreme dullness that prevailed in the mining districts.

BUILDINGS.

General Post Office Building.

It having been found necessary to provide for the increasing business of the Electric Telegraph in this building, extended accommodation has been secured for the purpose by enlarging the room previously used. This, however, has had the effect of restricting, to a somewhat inconvenient degree, the space required for sorting the English mail; and for this reason, and with a view to the consolidation of the Department, as well as on the score of economy, it is highly desirable that other arrangements should shortly be made for removing the staff of operators now engaged at Market square to the General Post Office.

The clock bells ordered from England have arrived, and are, with the requisite machinery for striking the hours and chiming the quarters, now being hung in the tower. Glass of an improved description, intended to replace that previously used for the illuminated dials, has also been received. It is expected that the whole will be completed by the beginning of May.

CHANGES IN AND PRESENT STRENGTH OF THE STAFF OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The services of the Telegraph Manager at Albury were dispensed with on the 14th January 1870, and on the 31st October the Victorian operators were altogether withdrawn from that station, an agreement having been entered into with the New South Wales Government to conduct the business for this Colony, in consideration of a contribution towards the maintenance of the Telegraph station at Albury of £200 per annum. The saving effected by this change is shown at page 7 of the Report for 1869.

The extension of the facilities for telegraphic communication, through the reduction of the rates formerly charged, rendered necessary a considerable increase in the staff of Telegraphic Messengers, and, in consequence, those messengers who had served satisfactorily for one year as supernumeraries have been provided for on the 3rd Schedule, and their places filled up as the augmentation of business demanded.

Within the year 1870 eight officers resigned their appointments; one officer (5th Class) was superannuated; three officers retired from ill-health; two died; and three were dismissed.

The third or northern section, from 19° 30' to Port Darwin, is being erected by contract. The first pole planted at Port Darwin 17th September last, and, by advices dated 8th November 1870, 50 miles of line reported finished, and by this time (February 1871) 150 miles would have been completed, and in working order. Constant communication is kept up by telegraph between Port Darwin and the working party as the line progresses.
