# REPORT.

Since the Report for the year 1872 was laid before Parliament there has been a change in the Postal Law of the Colony, *The Post Office Amendment Act* having come into operation on the 1st July 1873. This Act, which is to be construed with and as part of *The Post Office Statute* 1866, provides in Part I. for the reduction of the postage on inland newspapers from one penny to one halfpenny.

It confirms certain orders made previous to the passing of the amending Act for the reduction of intercolonial postage, respecting the validity of which doubts had been raised, and gives power to the Governor in Council to further alter the scale and rate of postage for the purpose of any arrangement with the authorities of any British Possession or Foreign Country, for the transmission of correspondence between such places and Victoria.

It authorizes the transmission of inland letters bearing a Victorian postage stamp of any denomination, and the collection of deficient postage on delivery.

It provides facilities for the transmission of telegrams through the post from places to which the Electric Telegraph has not been extended, it allows telegraphic messages to pass through the post in Victoria free of postage,\* and authorizes payment of fees on Victorian telegrams to be made in postage stamps.

It restores to the Postmaster-General power to issue licenses for the sale of postage stamps, and to allow a commission to vendors not exceeding one shilling in the pound.

There are also many other amendments in Part I. which were found to be necessary for the convenience of the public and for the better administration of the Postal Department.

Part II. of the amended Act contains some slight alterations in the law relating to the Post Office Savings Bank, and includes clauses respecting the funds of deceased and incapacitated depositors, and for the settlement of disputes which could previously only be dealt with under the Regulations of the Governor in Council.

Part III. repeals and re-enacts those parts of the Criminal Law and Practice Statute and of the Public Works Statute which relate to Electric Telegraphs, and gives power to the Postmaster-General to enter into contracts for the construction and maintenance of lines of Electric Telegraph, thus incorporating the Electric Telegraph with the Postal Law.

## REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

### *Revenue.*

The returns for 1873 show an increase over those for 1872 of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on account of postage, &c., and  $6\frac{1}{2}$  on account of telegraph collections.

The gross amount to be credited for the years above named is as follows:—

The increase in the postal revenue has to be attributed chiefly to the inland correspondence, the corrected returns of which are nearly  $8\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. higher than those for the previous year, the other sources of revenue, as shown by the statement which follows, presenting but little change.

The postal revenue has, it is estimated, suffered to the extent of £3,500, in consequence of the reduction in the inland newspaper rate, which took effect on the 1st July last.

The increase in the telegraph revenue is accounted for in the following manner:—

The local or Victorian private messages advanced from 515,604 in 1872 to 531,489 in 1873. The revenue derived therefrom being in—

The intercolonial private telegrams increased from 47,698 in 1872, to 62,359 in 1873, the revenue being in—

The satisfactory condition of the Telegraph revenue, which fully realizes the estimate, has to be ascribed chiefly to the large increase in commercial and social messages; the messages relating to mining business having fallen off in number and value.

A reduced uniform rate between Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland, from 3s. to 2s., and 6s. to 3s. respectively, for ten words or under, as arranged at the late Conference, came into operation on the 1st November; the result of which, so far, shows an increase of 52 per cent. in the number of messages transmitted, and a decrease in value of about 10 per cent. for November and December 1873, as compared with the same period in 1872. But under the old rate Victoria obtained only one-third of the receipts on the business transacted with New South Wales; whereas under the reduced rate Victoria receives one-half; thus the Victorian revenue is increased in proportion to the increase in the number of messages.

The Australian foreign business has been steadily maintained. The number of messages transmitted between Europe, the East, and the different Australian Colonies for 1873 was 8,994, value £108,564 19s. 9d., of which Victoria contributed 4,845 messages, value £62,155 7s. 1d.

#### Expenditure.

The gross expenditure of the Department during 1872 and 1873 was—

showing a decrease during 1873 of £2,461.

The net cost of the Department during 1873 was £11,536 less than in 1872, and, but for the reduction in the newspaper rates above referred to, the saving would have amounted to £15,036.

The sum of £10,352 has also been expended, under the direction of the Postmaster-General, in the construction, and £5,167 in the repairs of lines of Electric Telegraph in different parts of the colony, and in the purchase of material for future extensions and repairs, in conformity with the provisions of *The Post Office Amendment Act*, Part III., to which reference is made on the preceding page. Expenditure of this kind was, up to 30th June 1873, borne upon the Estimates of the Public Works Department.

One thousand two hundred and forty-two registered letters are included in these numbers, 209 of which contained enclosures of value (amount, shown below), 21 covered articles, and 1088 were without valuable contents, or the value thereof was not known to the Department.

Seventy-seven ordinary letters also contained articles of value. Ten letters with articles on hand at close of year.

Seventy-two letters were posted during the year with obscene or libellous addresses.

One hundred and sixty-three of the "Irregularly Posted" letters did not bear any names or addresses whatever, and 799 had imperfect addresses (i.e., wanting either name or address; these letters could not, in consequence, be sent to their intended destinations. Some of them enclosed value. The remainder under this heading were unpaid, or insufficiently paid letters, including 1616 valentines.

One hundred and thirty-one letters were ascertained to bear wrong addresses; some of these also contained enclosures, to the value of nearly £360. The errors of the senders in these cases were corrected where practicable, and where that was not possible the letters were returned or otherwise dealt with. One hundred and fourteen envelopes without correspondence covered enclosures to the value of over £5000.

Eight hundred and fifty-eight letters were "refused" by the persons addressed on account of postal charges (this does not show any actual increase of such letters during the year, the number for 1872 being 613, and for the respective half-years from 1st July to 31st December 495 and 349); many of these letters also contained value.

In addition to the above number of letters, 3751 packets were also dealt with. Forty-eight packets and papers were posted in violation of the Postal Regulations; some enclosed bottles of liquid and other matter not allowed to pass through the Post Office.

The Post Offices at Talbotville, Gipsy Village, and Stonyford, which were closed respectively on the 1st June and 31st December 1871 and 25th April 1873, have been re-opened.

Five Post Offices were closed, viz.:—Watgania, Morwell, Kolora, Staughton Vale, and Ghin-Ghin.

The names of the following offices have been changed:—Sago Hill to "Haddon;" Leigh Road Railway Station to "Leigh Road," and Tooliorook to "Derrinallum."

Alexandra, Berwick, Coburg, Footscray, Leigh Road, Rokewood, Stockyard Creek, and Stratford, have been opened as combined Post and Telegraph Offices.

A telegraph Station was opened at Wilson's Promontory on the 3rd April 1873.

The Telegraph Station at Serpentine Creek, closed on the 3rd February 1870, was re-opened on the 16th September 1873.

The number of Post Offices on the 31st December was 764.

Owing to the steady increase in the correspondence received for delivery in Melbourne and suburbs, it became necessary to increase the staff of the Letter Carriers, and eleven additional men were accordingly appointed and apportioned as follows:—Four for the city, and one to each of the undermentioned localities, viz.—East Melbourne, West Melbourne, Carlton, Richmond, Prahran, Emerald Hill, and St. Kilda.

By this arrangement the several deliveries by letter carriers are now effected, both in the city and suburbs, from half an hour to an hour earlier than formerly.

The boundaries of the letter delivery at North Carlton have been extended from Reid street to Brunswick, and a second daily delivery by carrier has been established.

## BUILDINGS.—GENERAL POST OFFICE.

During the year a contract was entered into by the Public Works Department, for repairing, cleansing, and painting the General Post Office building for the first time since its occupation in July 1867.

Alterations have been effected by which stamps can be purchased, and letters registered over counters inside the building, instead of through small windows from the outside corridors, an arrangement which has, it is believed, afforded greater convenience to the public, and is much more satisfactory to the officers of the Department engaged in the transaction of this kind of business.

The want of further accommodation for the increasing business of the Head Office is productive of much inconvenience; more especially with reference to the Mail Branch, and the Money Order and Savings Bank Branch, and the necessity for extending the building becomes daily more pressing.

## OTHER BUILDINGS.

The new Post and Telegraph Office at Brighton has been completed and occupied.

The new buildings at Avoca, Buninyong, Eaglehawk, Majorca, and Wangarratta are either finished or will be ready for occupation early in 1874.

Contracts have been entered into for new buildings at Casterton, Castlemaine, Seymour, and Stawell, and the buildings are progressing.

Arrangements have been made for the erection of offices at Coleraine and St. Kilda.

A building has been purchased at Wood's Point.

Premises for Post and Telegraph Offices have been rented at Alexandra, Berwick, Footscray, Leigh Road, New Gisborne, Prahran, Sorrento, Stockyard Creek, and Stratford.

It has been decided to provide additional accommodation at Warrnambool, by the erection of a new frontage to the present Post and Telegraph Office.

At Wilson's Promontory office accommodation, quarters, and stabling, are about to be provided.

Additions, alterations, and repairs have been effected, or are in progress, at Beechworth, Belfast, Benalla, Clunes, Colac, Collingwood, Daylesford, Echuca, Geelong, Kyneton, Mortlake, Port Albert, Portland, Queenscliff, Sale, Sandridge, Yackandandah, &c.

An additional iron receiving pillar has been erected at Eaglehawk.

## POSTAGE STAMPS.

A new ninepenny stamp was issued on the 25th March.

Provisional halfpenny stamps for Inland Newspaper postage were issued on the 25th June.

The twopenny dies, in use since January 1870, being worn out, a twopenny stamp of a new design was issued on the 1st of October.

Telegraph forms, with a one shilling postage stamp embossed upon each, and paged, perforated, and bound into books of 20 and 40 forms each, and valued £1 and £2 respectively, were issued on the 10th October.

Licenses to sell postage stamps under sections 15 and 16 of the "Post Office Amendment Act 1873," revocable at pleasure, were issued on the 1st of July, allowing a commission, fixed by the Governor in Council, of ninepence in the £ upon £5 worth and upwards purchased at any one time.

One hundred and twenty-six new stamp licenses were issued and eighty-three revoked, making the total number at present 444, or an increase over last year of 10 per cent.

## ELECTRIC TELEGRAPH.

*Additional Wires and Extensions.*

During the year the line between Port Albert and Wilson's Promontory was completed and communication established.

The new lines between Scarsdale and Rokewood, and Jamieson, and Alexandra, were also completed and brought into operation.

The Railway special wire on the North-Eastern line was continued from Longwood to Wodonga, and communication obtained by means of loops at Violet Town, Benalla, Wangaratta, Chiltern, Barnawartha, and Wodonga.

Telegraphic communication between Melbourne and the Sanitary Station, Point Nepean, has been established, the special wire to Mornington having been continued to that place by way of Dromana and Sorrento.

The Eastern and Southern suburban offices have now been placed on one circuit with Melbourne.

The wire has been extended from Brunswick to Coburg.

A special wire has been run from Geelong to Winchelsea and Birregurra.

An additional wire has been run from Stawell to Beaufort.

The augmentation of the business of the Department referred to above also made it desirable to increase the assistance in despatching Mails at the General Post Office, and the number of assistant sorters who were temporarily appointed last year for that purpose has been largely added to in consequence.

The Post and Telegraph Offices at the following places, namely, Market Square, Brighton, Emerald Hill, Hawthorn, Sandridge, St. Kilda, Alexandra, Berwick, Eaglehawk, Footscray, Leigh Road, Majorca, Lintons, Malmesbury, Mornington, New Gisborne, Prahran, Stratford, Stuartmill, Taradale, and Terang, are under the charge of postmistresses, and at the first six named places female assistants are employed. Female assistants are also employed at Cape Otway, Cape Schanck, Creswick, Dandenong, Kerang, Longwood, Queenscliff, Shady Creek, Scarsdale, and Stockyard Creek.

The employment of female operators in the Department has admitted of the advantages of electric telegraph communication being extended to several places in the country which must otherwise have been left without the accommodation, as the business at the stations referred to only justifies the payment of such salaries as those for which the services of postmistresses can be secured.

During the year the services of two officers were dispensed with, two officers were reduced in pay, and two officers resigned.
