REPORT.

As required under section 57 of the Post Office Statute, 29th Vict., No. 298, the Postmaster-General has the honor to present a general report upon the affairs of the

Post Office in the several departments thereof for the year 1881.

The large increase in both postal and telegraph business shown by the accompanying returns is highly satisfactory, and must be regarded as one of the best evidences of the commercial and general prosperity realized in Victoria during the past year. This is especially noticeable as, following the unusual activity of the preceding (Exhibition) year, it was feared there might be some reaction; so far, however, from such proving to be the case, the increase in postal revenue was larger than in any previous year since 1854, and the telegraph revenue also far exceeded the amount estimated.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

Revenue.

The net Postal Revenue for the year 1881 was £209,086 5s. 11d., as against £191,849 19s. 1d. for 1880, showing an increase of £17,236 6s. 10d., or nearly 9 per cent.

The Commission on Money Orders for 1881 was £6,816 14s. 7d., as against

£6,311 9s. 8d., showing an increase of £505.

The net Electric Telegraph Revenue for 1881 amounted to £69,149 0s. 11d., as against £60,163 1s. 7d. for 1880, showing an increase of £8,986, or nearly 15 per cent.

The net total Postal and Telegraph Revenue for 1881 amounted to £285,052, as against £258,323 in 1880, showing an increase of £26,728, or nearly 10 per cent.

Expenditure.

The Expenditure of the Department for the year 1881 was £389,216 19s. 5d., as against £377,363 for the year 1880, showing an increase of £11,853, or about 3_6 per cent.

The sum of £15,595 19s. 6d. was also expended in the construction, repairs, &c., of the telegraph lines—formerly horne by the Public Works Department.

With reference to the deficit shown in the above return amounting to £104,164, it is pointed out that the expenditure includes £15,530, subsidy for the Duplicate Telegraph Cable, and £5,000, the estimated cost of manufacture and issue of duty and fee stamps; also on the contract for steam postal communication (after deducting contributions from other colonies and postages received) £22,914, or £4,730 in excess of the loss under this head in the preceding year.

The sum paid to the Railway Department for conveyance of mails amounted to

£36,291 1s.

The value of telegrams sent on the Government service amounted to £23,378 17s. 9d., and it is estimated that the postage on official correspondence transmitted would amount to about £35,000.

In several of the country offices the postmasters and telegraph managers also perform the duties of receiver and paymaster, which entails additional expense on

this department.

The value of the duty and fee stamps issued (all of which are manufactured in and at the cost of this department) during the year amounted to the following:—

Duty £107,987 Fee 60,248

paid into the Treasury, but forming no part of the revenue of the Post Office.

STEAM POSTAL SERVICE.

The contract with the Peninsular and Oriental Company for the conveyance of mails fortnightly between Melbourne and Galle has been performed throughout the

year in a highly satisfactory manner.

In Appendices C and D will be found tables showing time occupied in the transit of mails between the United Kingdom and Victoria. On no single occasion have the mails been delivered in Melbourne by the company's steamers after appointed time. The longest period occupied in transit of mails from London to Melbourne was 39 days 15 hours and 15 minutes, or three and a half hours less than that allowed by the table (39 days 18 hours and 45 minutes), and the shortest time 36 days 2 hours, or 3 days 16 hours and 45 minutes early. With regard to homeward mails the table allows from despatch of steamer from Hobson's Bay to delivery of mails in the London office 40 days 11 hours during six months of the year, and 42 days 11 hours during the period of the south-west monsoons. The average time actually occupied in transit of homeward mails during both ordinary and monsoon seasons was 40 days 14 hours and 21 minutes.

Considering, however, the increasing importance of these colonies, it would appear that they cannot long withhold their adhesion to the Paris Postal Convention; but, in the meantime, I beg to suggest, in lieu of the arrangements previously proposed through the Government of Great Britain, that the transmission of correspondence between France and Victoria should be regulated by provisions similar to those set forth in the "arrangement concerning the entry into the General Postal Union of British India and the French Colonies," signed at Berne 27th January 1876, e.g. :-

I. The letter postage to be 6d. per half ounce in Victoria, and 60c. per 15 grammes in France, and

corresponding rates for other postal articles.

II. Victoria to provide for conveyance of its mails by sea, and to pay the Egyptian and Italian transit charges. The French Post Office to provide for the carriage of its mails through Italy and Egypt, and account (through the London Post Office, as now) for sea postage, at the rate of 25fr. per kilogramme of letters, and Ifr. per kilogramme of other articles.

III. Unpaid and insufficiently prepaid letters to be forwarded, double the unpaid or deficient postage

to be collected on delivery, and retained by the country collecting it.

If you approve of the foregoing proposals, I shall feel obliged by your acquainting me whether you will be prepared to bring them into force between France and Victoria, without regard to the action that may be taken by the other colonies in this matter; but if, on the other hand, you do not concur therein, or deem it inadvisable to agree to any arrangement which is not acceptable to all the Australian Governments, I shall be glad to do everything in my power to secure a general assent to any equitable proposition that may be made.

OTHER POSTAGE ARRANGEMENTS.

Since the publication of the last Report the postage on letters for India, Hong Kong, and all other British possessions and foreign countries in the eastern seas has been reduced to 6d. per half ounce, and the postage to Canada viá San Francisco has been reduced to the same rate under arrangement with the Postmaster-General, Ottawa.

Arrangements have also been made for transmission of unpaid and insufficiently paid letters to the neighboring colonies, the United Kingdom, India, and the colony of Netherlands-India.

ELECTRIC TELEGRAPHS.

The business of this branch of the Department continues to increase as the lines are extended and additional offices opened. During the past year extensions have been made from Dimboola to Border Town (S.A.), a distance (including the portion of the work in South Australia) of nearly 90 miles; also from Creswick to Smeaton, 9 milcs, viâ Allandalc and Kingston. A short extension was likewise constructed from Talbot to Amherst (3 miles), and from Shepparton to Numurkah (wire only). Contracts have been executed for extensive repairs, re-poling, &c., incidental to maintenance, on sections of lines between Avoca and St. Arnaud, Horsham and Stawell (a transfer to the railway route), Portland and the South Australian boundary, Port Albert and Wilson's Promontory, Geelong and Ballaarat, Beechworth, Wodonga, Chiltern and Wahgunyah, Beechworth and Bright. Offices were opened at Warragul, Amherst, and Wunghnu; and on the railway circuit, at Newport, Daylesford, Romsey, Queenscliff, Prince's Bridge, Lancefield, Tallygaroopna, Numurkah, Brighton Beach, Middle Brighton, North Brighton, Windsor, Emerald Hill, Drouin, Hawthorn, South Yarra, Elsternwick, Caulfield, and Mordialloc. The offices at Moe and Glenorchy have been transferred to the railway stations, and the office at the Exhibition Building was closed on the termination of the public business of that institution.

Direct working between Melbourne and Adelaide, by means of the special interior line via Horsham, Dimboola, and Border Town, was established during the latter portion of the year, and the duplex system was commenced on the 9th January The results have been most satisfactory, and the business of the Departments in the respective colonies has been materially accelerated. This line being comparatively free from the obstructions to good working experienced on the older lines near the coast (owing to adverse meteorological conditions) communication in almost all weather has been rendered practically certain, while the presence of several alternative routes between Melbourne and Adelaide, as well as between Melbourne and Sydney, tend to secure for the intercolonial telegraph service a degree of permanence not

hitherto attainable.

 Λ large increase in the general business of the lines has marked the records of the past year—in messages, to the extent of 120,837; and in revenue, to £9,175 (the latter equivalent to nearly 15 per cent. additional on previous returns).

These figures are indicative of an increasing tendency toward a more general use of the telegraph, and also serve to show the capacity of the system for effectively

performing its work, or for meeting enlarged requirements by the public.

The growth of the telegraph may receive a partial illustration by mention of the fact that whereas, in March 1854, the lines then in existence were worked by batteries, at the Melbourne office, numbering less than 10 cells, and weighing about 45 lbs., there are at present in daily use at the same office no less than 1,861 cells of battery, weighing in the aggregate 24,810 lbs.

The quadruplex system is now regularly maintained between Melbourne and

Sydney, with satisfactory results.

Owing to the increased business between Melbourne and the principal inland towns, it has been decided to apply the duplex system of working, especially with Geelong, Ballarat, and Sandhurst, and the necessary instruments have been ordered for that purpose.

During the year a system of testing daily the electrical condition of the lines, and localising faults, was initiated at the head office. The results have proved very

satisfactory.

The business transacted at the Flemington Race course continues to increase. The receipts on last Cup day amounted to £190 17s.—an increase of £20 over the

The increasing number of street wires and poles, chiefly due to the large demand for telephonic communication, has formed a subject for extended consideration as to the best means for meeting the difficulties presented by the necessity, on one hand, of providing for the public wants, and on the other, of reducing the extent of obstruction to the thoroughfares, as far as practicable, and removing objections on the ground of the unsightly appearance of wires and fittings in certain positions.

The fullest and most recent information is at present being obtained regarding the best form of subterranean conductors or cables, similar to those employed in London and other large cities, cost of manufacture, &c., and it is hoped that within the ensuing year the Department may be in a position to remove at least a large portion of the poles now erected in several of the principal streets, and to replace the

aerial wires by subterranean conductors.

The arrangement with the Melbourne Tramway and Omnibus Company, by means of which the messengers employed in delivering telegrams in the city and suburbs are provided with conveyance, for a fixed annual charge, in the vehicles of the company, has been found to work so advantageously in expediting the duties of the messengers that it is now continued with, it is reported, satisfactoryresults.

The connection of the various branch offices with the central or chief office, by means of pneumatic tubes, still remains unaccomplished. The arguments in favor of such an arrangement were forcibly detailed in the last Annual Report (p. 18), and it is hoped that the matter will be dealt with at an early date. The chief objection to the introduction of the system in past years, viz., the presence of a steam engine, coal smoke, &c., &c., has been almost entirely obviated by the adoption of the gas motor, and as the latter possesses the advantages of economy and cleanliness there are strong grounds in favor of the plan proposed. The cost of connecting the offices at the Custom House and Spencer Street Railway Station with the head office would be comparatively moderate (under £5,000), and it will eventually become a necessity that such a provision should be made, in order that the increasing business of the service may be properly transacted.

Telegraphic communication with Gabo Island, which had been interrupted during the latter portion of last year, has now been again restored on a more permanent basis than formerly, through the action of the Government of New South Wales. Difficulties had prevailed for a considerable period in maintaining the connection between the island and the main land, and the matter led to some correspondence between the Departments of the two colonies, as the interests of both appeared to be involved in preserving the establishment of the telegraph with the lighthouse at Gabo. Up to the present date there has been no further interruption, and reports are daily

received from that point relating to shipping, coast meteorology, &c.

The desirableness of a reduction of the high rate charged for the transmission of telegrams between Victoria and Tasmania was brought by this department under notice of the authorities in Tasmania in 1879, but no successful results attended the

The matter was then allowed to rest until 1881, when the question was again raised and, after considerable correspondence (for copies, see Appendix W.), arrangements were completed for the charge on a ten-word telegram between the two places to be reduced from 6s. to 3s. To accomplish this end, Victoria and Tasmania agreed to reduce their land charges for such messages from 1s. to 6d, and each to pay £600 per annum to the Cable Company to protect them against anticipated loss consequent upon their consenting to charge 2s. instead of 4s. for transmitting telegrams over the cable. The new rates came into operation 1st January 1882.

PORT DARWIN CABLE.

At the Conference of 1878, when it was decided to arrange for the construction and maintenance of the duplicate cable between Port Darwin and Penang, it was resolved that the cost of the subsidy be paid by the different Australasian colonies rateably in proportion to their respective populations. In the first instance, the basis of allotment of cost to each of the colonies to be the population as officially estimated on 31st December 1876, and that the contributions should be re-adjusted upon the basis of the population as ascertained by the next general census. The census having been taken in April last, it is computed that, according to the ascertained number of the population of the contributing colonies respectively, Victoria will have to pay, under the new scale, £1,321 19s. 6d. per annum less than previously.

There were no interruptions to communication by submarine cable with Europe, India, &c., during 1881. The maintenance of the several cable sections appears to have been satisfactorily conducted. In order, however, that the possible

contingency of an extended interruption on the land sections in Australia may be reduced to the lowest minimum practicable, and the fullest benefit realized by the several colonies from the provision of the cable duplication (on account of which a heavy subsidy is paid), it will be necessary, as indicated by previous reports on the subject, that a connecting land line should be constructed between Normanton (or the nearest station in Queensland) and the most convenient point of junction on the Port Darwin line, probably Daly Waters or the Katherine. It is hoped that early steps may be initiated for carrying out this most necessary work.

It is reported that the average time during 1881 occupied in transmission of

messages between Australia and England was three hours and fifteen minutes.

STAFF OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable G. D. Langridge was Acting Postmaster-General from the commencement of the year until the 9th of July, when he was succeeded by the Honorable Henry Bolton, who was appointed Postmaster-General from that date.

During the year 14 officers were dismissed or dispensed with; 6 retired, either through infirmity or in consequence of their having attained the age of sixty years;

23 resigned, and 4 died.

The following particulars are not included in the above return :-

Out of a staff of eighty-one female assistants employed in the head office, forty-four were absent during 326 days, of which number ten persons were absent during 236 days.

Out of ninety letter carriers, forty-six were absent during 359 days, of which number eight were absent during 178 days. Out of seventy-four messengers, twenty-seven were absent during 130 days, of which number three were absent during 80 days.

FEMALE ASSISTANTS.

Since the date of last report four postmistresses and six assistants have retired from the service, and nine new appointments have been made to the charge of country stations, and in different branches of the General Post Office and Head Telegraph Office.

Several females have also been admitted as probationers, to acquire a knowledge of telegraphy, but as the number of persons desiring a similar privilege has become very considerable, and the prospect of their subsequently obtaining employment very remote, it has been determined, in order to prevent the loss and disappointment that must otherwise inevitably be occasioned, not to entertain any further applications of this nature.

Arrangements have, however, been made by the Committee of the Technological Museum in connection with the Public Library, Melbourne, for the re-formation of classes to afford instruction in telegraphy, and a large number of persons have availed themselves of the opportunity of attending these classes. Courses of instruction in telegraphy are also given in connection with the School of Mines, Ballarat, and many have passed the required examination at that place.

The Postmaster-General desires, however, that it should be most distinctly understood that the passing of an examination or possession of a certificate of competency as a telegraphist gives no right or special claim to public employment; and the number of persons who have already qualified themselves as female operators is far in excess of the probable requirements of this department for several years to

come.

Buildings.—General Post Office.

No practical steps have yet been taken for providing the extended accommodation most urgently required for performing the greatly increased, and still

increasing, business of the Post and Telegraph Offices, Melbourne.

It is believed to be the intention to place a sum on the next Public Works Estimates for proceeding with the erection of that portion of the main General Post Office building, as designed, to be extended to the corner of Little Bourke street. is also proposed to erect temporary offices on the land opposite the roadway at the eastern side of the present building.

In the meantime, however, the growing magnitude of daily business will render it indispensably necessary to rent buildings for immediate occupation, in order to

avoid occasioning serious loss and inconvenience to the public.

When, during last year, the Loan Bill for various public works was under consideration, the above subject was brought under notice of the Minister by the Deputy Postmaster-General, in the following memorandum:

I beg to bring under the special notice of the Hon, the Postmaster-General the very urgent necessity that exists for providing funds, without further delay, to extend the space and accommodation required to carry on the duties of the Post Office and Telegraph Department.

Upon the preparation of the Estimates in several years past the completion of the new General Post Office building has been proposed and urged as one of the most essential public works of the colony, but, in every instance, this item has been struck out, and, up to the present, the matter appears to stand indefinitely postponed.

In each of the Annual Reports upon the affairs of the Department laid before Parliament during

the last nine years reference has also been made to this subject.

In the last of these Reports attention was again drawn, in explicit terms, to the "inadequacy and unsuitableness of the temporary wooden structure at the corner of Little Bourke street, in which the large and important business of the Head Telegraph Office is carried on"; and, it is added, "Not only is the space altogether too limited to admit of the duties being properly performed, but the confined and heated atmosphere in which the operators have to work is most oppressive and injurious. The same may likewise be said of the temporary building provided for the use of the public in transacting Money Order and Savings Bank business. So great has the inconvenience arising from this cause become, that further accommodation, in order to transact the daily business of the Department in its several branches, is now a matter of indispensable necessity. Unless steps be taken to carry out the proposal mentioned in last year's Report, of creeting temporary buildings on the land adjoining the General Post Office, which is leased by the Government with the right of purchase, it will be absolutely necessary to rent some convenient business premises in the vicinity for the purpose of a Money Order Office and Savings Bank; and, having regard to the additional expense that will thus be unavoidably incurred, as well as the insecurity of the present fragile and inflammable telegraph office, it is considered most advisable that financial provision should be made without the least further delay for completing the permanent General Post Office building, either in accordance with the original design or some modification thereof."

With regard to the danger there is of the dilapidated building used as the Head Telegraph Office taking fire, I would point out that, should such a catastrophe occur, apart from the heavy loss that would be occasioned by destruction of telegraph material, the instruments in use could not be readily replaced, there being no sufficient stock in the colony available, and, as a necessary consequence, until supplies could be obtained from the neighboring colonies or from England, the whole telegraph service would be paralysed, involving not merely a considerable sacrifice of revenue, but incalculable damage to mercantile interests and

most serious inconvenience to the public generally.

I would further remark that owing to the large increase in the Money Order business, which is growing rapidly and is about to be extended to India, China, the United States of America, and other countries, also the increase in the Post Office Savings Bank deposits (the balance in hand now exceeding a million sterling), the accommodation provided for that branch has become so utterly inadequate that it will be necessary at once to lease a city building in some suitable position expressly for the transaction of this business.

In connection with this subject it may be mentioned that some years ago the Government purchased a block of land between the roadway at the side of the General Post Office and the lane formerly known as the Heratd passage. More recently the land extending back therefrom to Little Bourke street has been leased with the right of purchase, but to render the space properly and permanently available for the prospective requirements of the Department it is in the highest degree desirable that the Government should arrange for the absolute purchase of the land leased as above stated, and also acquire the frontage to Bourk street, extending 60 feet castward from the side gate of the General Post Office. This land is believed to be now obtainable at a fair valuation, and the buildings thereon could be adapted for use as a temporary Telegraph Office, without incurring the large annual expenditure otherwise inevitable for the rental of less conveniently situated premises elsewhere for this purpose.

I may further remark that since the opening of the present partially completed building in 1867, which was then only sufficient for the requirements of the time, the entire work of the Department has more than doubled, and in anticipation of a similar progressive increase in the years to come, with the addition of new schemes for the public benefit which may be engrafted upon the existing organization, it is of the

utmost importance to make timely and adequate provision for the certain necessities of the future.

In asking that this important question may be brought under the notice of the Cabinet at the earliest opportunity, I would venture to express the hope that while provision is being made for various other public undertakings, the pressing claims of the Postal and Telegraph services which are so closely identified with the interests of every member of the community will be duly and promptly recognized.

Other Buildings.

The new buildings at Belfast and Jamieson have been completed and occupied.

Buildings are in progress at Benalla and Portland.

Additions, alterations, and repairs, more or less extensive, have been carried out at Bairnsdale, Ballarat, Collingwood, Dunolly, Geelong, Kyneton, St. Arnaud, Sale, Sandridge, Seymour, Smythesdale, Warrnambool, and Wood's Point.

The building and Flagstaff at Cunninghame (Lakes Entrance) has been removed

to a position of comparative safety from the threatened incursion of the sea.

The establishment at Buln Buln has been removed to Warragul.

Letter Pillars.

Iron Receiving Pillar Boxes have been provided at Benalla, Collingwood (2), Dunolly, Emerald Hill, Fitzroy North, Geelong (2), Hamilton, Kyneton, Melbourne, and Melbourne West, Portland, Prahran, Queenscliff (2), Sandhurst (5), and South Yarra.

NEW POST AND TELEGRAPH OFFICES, ETC.
